Steve's Prince of Steaks

While Pat's may be the self-proclaimed "king" of the cheesesteak, we have to give the award for the best in the city to his unofficial heir. This no-frills eatery is one of the best-kept secrets in town. The real question: wit or witout?

Twenty Manning Grill

Locals love this New American spot for their flavorful small plates and one of the best outdoor dining experiences in the city. Our pick? The Grilled Prime Berkshire Pork Chop, paired with honey mission figs, melted gorgonzola and seared brussel sprouts.

Chris' Jazz Cafe

Mac's Tavern

Fans of It's Always Sunny in Philadelphia will love this Old City tavern, which is co-owned by the show's stars Rob McElhenney and Kaitlin Olson. With it's laid-back ambiance and casual fare, Mac's is the perfect place to grab a draught and catch a game.

Village Whiskey

Iron Chef Jose Garces' intimate speakeasy features an impressive assortment of whiskey, bourbon, rye and scotch. And since we're talking Garces, the food at Village Whiskey is nothing to scoff at. From bourbon-glazed angus burgers to an à la carte raw bar, be sure to bring an appetite along with your thirst.

Yard's Brewing Company

They don't call Philly "America's best beer-drinking city" for nothing. Located close to scenic Penn's Landing, Yard's Brewery is known for their Philadelphia Pale Ale, which the New York Times rated as one of the best pale ales in the country.



Philadelphia's Magic Gardens
